Ralph Vituccio is an Associate Teaching Professor in the Entertainment Technology Center at Carnegie Mellon as well as teaching in the IDeATe and the English Depart at CMU. Ralph is also an Independent filmmaker with his film company, Ralph Vituccio Productions. His film, "Ship Breakers", (2014), takes place on the beaches of Alang, India where over 300 supertankers and cruise ships are run aground and torn apart by hand by thousands of impoverished workers. The film looks at the devastating impact ship recycling has on the environment and the health of the workers.
